## THE NEBRASKA–SOUTHEAST SOUTH DAKOTA SECTION OF THE

## MATHEMATICAL ASSOCIATION OF AMERICA (original name: The Nebraska Section) Compiled in April 2015



In 1972 the MAA produced a publication called THE MATHEMATICAL ASSOCIATION OF AMERICA: ITS FIRST FIFTY YEARS, edited by Kenneth O. May.

As mentioned on page 18, THE AMERICAN MATHEMATICAL MONTHLY was founded by Benjamin Finkel in 1894. He published it himself until 1913, and Nebraska played a role in the change of publishers (page 19):

In the summer of 1912 Finkel discussed with Slaught the probability that the printer, A . S. Dixon of Springfield, could not continue his personal and low cost services to the MONTHLY. As a result Slaught enlisted help from Florian Cajori at Colorado College and E. R. Hedrick of the University of Missouri. The Universities of Minnesota, Nebraska, Kansas, Indiana, and Iowa provided help and editorial representatives W. H. Bussey, W. C. Brenke, C. H. Ashton, R. D. Carmichael, and R. P. Baker beginning with volume 20 for 1913. Colorado, Michigan, Northwestern and Washington Universities and Oberlin College also cooperated.

Here is another excerpt, from pages 92-93:

## 1924 NEBRASKA

The first meeting was held March 14, 1924 at Lincoln [MONTHLY 31, 370-371]. On May 2, 1924 the newly formed section met with the Mathematics-Physics Section of the Nebraska Academy of Science. This indicates that perhaps the Mathematics-Science Section of the Academy pre-dated the Section of the Association. There were seventeen charter members, with Professor W. C. Brenke of the State University serving as the first Chairman and Emma E. Hawthorn the Secretary-Treasurer.

Nine papers were given at this first meeting, eight of them on pure or applied mathematics with only one related to teaching, the title being "An Example of the Value of Diophantine Analysis to the Teacher in the Secondary School." It was presented by A. E. Campbell from Omaha Technical High.

The close tie with the Academy of Science until 1965 is revealed in the original By-laws. Under the section on Meetings it is stated that "there shall be one regular annual meeting at the time of the meeting of the Nebraska Academy of Science, and such other meetings as may be arranged by the executive committee." In 1965 the section on meetings includes the provision for one annual meeting per year but no reference to the Academy.

The By-laws 1924-1965 restrict the membership to residents of Nebraska, eligible for membership in the Association, whereas the 1965 By-Laws extend the eligibility to those members of the Association who reside in territory not included in any Section and who notify the Section Secretary that they wish to be members of this Section.

The section on Name and Purpose indicates that the extended territory is intended to be certain named counties in South Dakota.

That publication referenced an article from the AMERICAN MATHEMATICAL MONTHLY. Here it is, from pages 370-371 of volume 31:

A meeting for the purpose of organizing a Nebraska Section of the Association was held at Lincoln March 14, 1924. Miss Emma Hanthorn of the State Teachers College at Kearney presided. After a brief discussion by Dr. W. C. Brenke of the State University outlining the history and purposes of the Association, and the policy of the MONTHLY, an executive committee was chosen to draw up the by-laws.

The newly formed section was called to meet jointly with the Mathematics-Physics Section of the Nebraska Academy of Sciences which met at Creighton College, Omaha, May 2, 1924. The Executive Committee presented the by-laws which were adopted and signed by the following charter members:

Harriet Anderson, Grand Island College; W. C. Brenke, University of Nebraska; A. L. Candy, University of Nebraska; A. R. Congdon, University of Nebraska; M. G. Gaba, <u>University</u> of Nebraska; Emma E. Hanthorn, Kearney Teachers College; Mary F. Jackson, Lincoln High School; Nellie M. Johnston, Gibbon High School; Stella B. Kirker, Lincoln High School; E. P. Martinson, University of Nebraska; R. M. McDill, Hastings College; J. E. Opp, University of Nebraska; T. A. Pierce, University of Nebraska; T. I. Porter, University of Omaha; W. T. Rigge, Creighton University; C. R. Sherer, University of Nebraska.

The following officers were elected for the ensuing year: Chairman—W. C. Brenke; Secretary-Treasurer—Emma E. Hanthorn; Member Executive Committee—R. M. McDill.

Papers read at the first annual meeting of the Nebraska Section of the Mathematical Association of America, meeting jointly with the Mathematics-Physics Section of the Academy of Sciences, with W. C. Brenke presiding, were as follows:

- (1) "A function approximating the least root of an equation," Prof. T. A. PIERCE, University of Nebraska. (By title.)
- (2) "The expansion of the cube root of an integer into a continued fraction," Mr. A. E. Anderson, University of Nebraska.
  - (3) "Some problems in geometry," Prof. M. G. GABA, University of Nebraska.
  - (4) "Two problems," Prof. R. M. McDill, Hastings College.
- (5) "A compound harmonic motion machine," (illustrated) Prof. W. H. RIGGE, Creighton University.
- (6) "An angle connected with the mean anomaly in elliptic orbits," Prof. W. C. Brenke, University of Nebraska.
- (7) "An explicit solution for a general congruence with prime modulus," Prof. PIERCE. (By title.)
  - (8) "A space transformation," Mr. E. P. MARTINSON, University of Nebraska.
- (9) "An example of the value of Diophantine analysis to the teacher in the secondary school," Mr. A. E. CAMPBELL, Omaha Technical High School.

The Section has produced a newsletter in most years, and many years had two newsletters, one in the spring just before the April meeting and one in the fall looking ahead to the next meeting. Our archives have most of the newsletters from 1979 to the present. Here are some notes and highlights from those newsletters.

In the 1970s and 1980s the newsletter was full of reports of various types:

The Friday night banquet was sometimes held in the home of the meeting chairman (the term in use at that time).

Several times an application for MAA membership was included in the newsletter.

The 1987 newsletter contained a historical listing of the meeting locations and officers of the Section since the founding of the Section in 1924. The same newsletter mentioned that Henry Cox was stepping down as the Secretary-Treasurer of the Section after 30 years of service in that position.

Some newsletters had information or advertising about programs from the national MAA office—for example, in 1981 the spring issue had an advertisement for the MAA Placement Test Program, and in the fall issue the Governor's Report mentions MAWIS, which stood for Mathematics At Work In Society, a program designed to show students in grades 8 through 10 how mathematics is used in various careers and thus encourage them to take more mathematics courses in school

Some familiar names were new to the Section, according to the 1989 newsletter: Jose Flores at the University of South Dakota, David Cooke at Hastings College, Glenn Ledder at the University of Nebraska-Lincoln, and John Fuelberth at Wayne State College.

Several of the spring meetings had panel discussions as part of the program. Some of the topics were:

The publication Everybody Counts—1990

Teaching mathematics with computer technology—1991

Computers and calculators in the classroom: good, bad, or ugly—1995

Distance learning—1998

Assessment issues—1999

The education of K-12 teachers—2000

There was frequent discussion of the use of technology: The late 1980s and early 1990s saw greater power in and increased use of computers and calculators in and out of the classroom. This was reflected in quite a few talks during those years on ways to use new technology successfully in various courses. In addition, the Governor's Report in the 1992 newsletter included this statement approved by the Board of Governors:

Electronic communication (such as electronic mail, electronic bulletin boards, electronic conferencing, remote file transfer, etc.) has become an essential and much used service in the professional life of mathematicians. The MAA urges that convenient access to electronic communication services be provided by every academic institution to the mathematicians they employ.

As a final note on changing technology, the University of Nebraska-Omaha reported in 1993 that the programs in Mathematics and Computer Science would split into separate departments beginning on January 1, 1994.

The bylaws of the Section were updated in 1973, 1994, and 2012. There was a proposed update in 1971, which was not adopted. It would have changed the name of the Section to the Nebraska/Southeast South Dakota Section and substituted "chairperson" or "president" for "chairman." The 1973 update, which was adopted, kept the Nebraska Section name and kept the title "chairman" for the meeting organizer. The name was officially changed to the Nebraska/Southeast South Dakota Section, which had been used unofficially for quite a few years, in 1994. This update also put "chair" in place of "chairman" and listed the Newsletter Editor as an officer of the Section.

The plenary speaker for the 2001 meeting at Doane College was artist Dick Termes, who is internationally known for his paintings of three-dimensional looking scenes on the surfaces of spheres. This began a string of speakers on the intersection of art and mathematics, continuing at least until 2007, when Jonathon Rogness from the Geometry Center at the University of Minnesota was one of the (three!) invited speakers.

Lastly, those who attended the 2006 meeting at Dana College remember their rides on a Segway scooter after the banquet.
