The first invited address on Friday was given by Bill Higgins, of Wittenberg University. Bill, the retiring Section President, spoke on "Insights from Archimedes."

After the Friday evening banquet, number theorist Carl Pomerance, of Dartmouth College, spoke on "The Covering Congruences of Paul Erdős." Carl is the author (as of April 11) of 159 mathematical papers, and has an Erdős number of 1. As we

Given two points x and y in a Jordan curve Γ, we denote by Γ(x,y) the smaller of the two subarcs of Γ\{x,y}.
 A Jordan curve (Γ,d) is c-bounded turning if for every points x and y in Γ we have
 diam_d (Γ[x, y]) ≤ c·d(x, y)
