News from Departments in the Section

Colorado School of Mines. (from Ardel Boes)

The Pre-Collegiate Minority Education Program was selected as a 1990-91 Program of Excellence by the Colorado Commission of Higher Education. A major part of this program is the Teacher Enhancement Program and Young Scholars Program for American Indians directed by Ardel Boes and Barbara Bath, both of CSM Department of Mathematical and Computer Sciences.

South Dakota School of Mines and Technology. (from Karen Whitehead)

New faculty, who joined SDSMT in 1989-90, include

Janet Burgoyne (from Idaho State University),

Sam Berney (from Idaho State University),

Manuel Penaloza (from Arizona State University; originally from Ecuador)

Both Janet and Sam are mathematicians, while Manuel is in Computer Science.

Sailes Sengrupta is on leave this year as a Senior Research Fellow at the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Research Laboratory (NOARL) in Monterey, CA, where he is working in the areas of digital image processing and pattern recognition. Ed Corwin and Toni Logar are on leave at Texas Tech, both working on Ph.D.'s in Computer Science.

Ron Weger, who has been with the department for 26 years, is retiring from teaching at the end of this semester in order to pursue his many interests in mathematics and computer science.

In July, SDSMT received an equipment grant (\$259,000) from SUN Microsystems and now has a SUN network consisting of a SUN4/280 server and 5 workstations.

We are experimenting (in a limited way) with the use of *Derive* in our calculus courses and would welcome hearing from anyone else who is doing the same.

University of Southern Colorado (from Melvin Withnell)

On leave for the fall semester of 1990 was John Gill. He traveled to Hungary to participate in the Third International Conference on Approximation Theory. At the conference he presented a paper, "Approximation of Iteration." While on leave he also wrote two other research papers and developed ten senior research projects for our mathematics majors.

Metropolitan State College of Denver (from George S. Donovan)

In late April of 1990, Charles Pine, visited the department. Dr. Pine is the moving force behind the Algebra Project, a new curriculum for high school Algebra I. His work is being tested in classrooms throughout the state of New Jersey and students in his Project classrooms have shown measurable improvement when compared with comparable students in the same school.

An additional finding of Dr. Pine was that students who postpone algebra do less well in the course. His work was supported by grants from AT&T Foundation and the Ford Foundation. His visit to Metro was sponsored by a System of Colleges Enrichment grant obtained by Ruth Yarar and Jim Loats.

Another visitor to the MSCD campus was Reuben Hersh, the author of The Mathematical Experience. He contended that mathematical philosophy was alive and well and that it had outgrown the stage of debating whether mathematics is discovered or created.

A returning faculty member was Patricia Montague, who has taught the past two years at Western Illinois University at Macomb, Illinois.

Two new faculty members are Janet Godfrey (whose masters degree is in education) and Judith Gurka (who recently completed her masters degree in computer science at UCD.) These are full-time, but temporary positions.

In addition, Patricia Montague gave "Abstract Data Types, Objects and Turbo Pascal 5.5" to the 23rd annual Conference of the Association of Small Computer Users in Education; William Emerson gave a talk on "Calculus and Mathematica at Metropolitan State College of Denver" to an NSF funded workshop; and Armando Gingras authored the article "Dining Philosophers Revisited" which appeared in the SIGSCE Bulletin.
